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BRISTOL SCHOOL'S DEDICATION TO PUPILS' COMMUNICATION CELEBRATED AT SHINE A LIGHT AWARDS

Fonthill Primary School in Bristol has been highly commended for the *Communication Commitment Award* category at a glittering awards ceremony in London, hosted by comedian David Baddiel, for its commitment to supporting children and young people's speech, language and communication development.

The **2015 Shine a Light Awards** are a national awards scheme organised by Pearson, in partnership with The Communication Trust, to celebrate innovative work, inspirational individuals and excellent practice in supporting children and young people's communication development.

Support for speech, language and communication is a key part of Fonthill Primary School's school improvement plan. The school has committed to communication by commissioning a speech and language therapist (SLT) to work in the school fortnightly and funding training for all staff, including how to help children build vocabulary and how to identify children with speech, language and communication needs (SLCN). Following training, every member of staff has completed an action plan with three communication actions that will be evaluated at the end of the school year.

In addition, the school has participated in *No Pens Day Wednesday*, The Communication Trust's annual opportunity for schools to put down pens and run a day of speaking and listening activities. It has also introduced policies such as pre-teaching topic vocabulary and a 'think time' rule, which ensures children have time to process what has been said before responding.

Parents are also engaged and supported with resources to support communication at home, opportunities to discuss concerns at coffee mornings and top tips to support communication in school newsletters. The Communication Commitment – an initiative run by The Communication Trust – has been made an integral part of the school and this is proudly displayed around the school building.

Melanie Knight, Inclusion Co-ordinator at Fonthill Primary School, said: "We are thrilled to have been highly commended for the Communication Commitment award at the 2015 Shine a Light Awards for our work supporting children and young people with their communication.

"All our staff are committed to helping our children to achieve their best in all areas of the

curriculum and personal development. We have worked hard over the past year to develop the way that we teach and support the communication and language skills of all children in the classroom and of groups and individuals through interventions.

“The Communication Commitment provided an excellent framework for whole-school development and we were fortunate to have the opportunity to work closely with very knowledgeable and supportive speech and language therapists from ChildSpeech. We've already seen great improvements in the communication and language skills of our children and this has also impacted on their attainment in reading, writing and maths. We look forward to building on these successes this year and in years to come.”
